Special Report from Michael Strickland on recent tournaments

As noted earlier, August has been a particularly busy month for Cammeray member, James Carlisle.

Over the weekend of 16th/17th, he played in the NSW AC Platinum/Gold Brooch at Tempe.

Six players, from as far afield as Canberra in the south and EDSAAC on the central coast, played a round-robin of 3 games on the Saturday and the other 2 on the Sunday. Having only just managed to beat Ted Woodley of Chatswood (16-15) in his opening match, James knuckled down, and won all his remaining 4 matches very convincingly, pegging out in every one of them, and allowing his opponents a total of only 8 hoops in the process! A great effort, for what James estimates is his first croquet trophy for 35 years.



The following weekend, 23rd/24th August, James paired with fellow Cammeray member, **Rob Elliott**, in the NSW Open Doubles competition, played at Eastwood. Eight pairs entered, and played in two blocks of four, giving three games on Saturday, and a semi-final and a final on Sunday.

Black Block was won by Trevor Bassett and Stephen Pearce each of whom is highly experienced and exceptionally capable, as borne out by their results – three wins without a point being scored against them: 26tp-0, 26-0, and 26tp-0.

In Yellow Block, James and Rob did *almost* as well, winning: 26-0, 26-2, and 26tp-0, with Rob contributing the triple in the last game.

The semi-finals went as expected, leaving James and Rob to face Trevor and Stephen in the final. This was one for the ages. Stephen had an early ball around to 4-back, before James, after one false start, did likewise. Then followed a tight tactical game with a few errors on both sides, leaving Trevor and Stephen ahead by two points with 20 minutes to play, and with Trevor's ball on 6 and Rob's on 4. In a tense finale, Rob was then able to pick up and play a 'clutch' break to the peg, quitting the lawn with seconds on the clock. Trevor failed to make any further hoops, time was called, and with the game already won, James finished off his last three hoops and pegged out, to make the final score 26-14. It is worth noting that Rob has now won this event three years running, with three different partners. James says that anyone wanting to partner him next year will have to deal with him first.

The WCF Management Committee is very pleased to announce that Rosemary Landrebe from Australia has been appointed Deputy Secretary-General with effect from 1 September 2025.

As previously announced, Debbie Lines will retire on 31 December 2025 on the completion of her four-year term, and it is the intention that Rosemary will become Secretary-General from 1st January 2026. She will be eligible to be appointed for a second four-year term from 1 January 2030 to 31 December 2033.

Rosemary has been a senior manager in various roles, specialising in operations management and analysis. She has experience of managing stakeholders at all levels

working across sporting and not-for-profit organisations. She has also spent time supporting Croquet Australia and the New South Wales boards, working on various implementation and improvement projects and coaching programs.
